segregation that oppresses Alabama and other southern states, becoming the propellant of the historic bus boycott in Montgomery led by Martin Luther King. Born in Connecticut in 1811, Harriet Beecher Stowe was an abolitionist,

author, and playwright. Slavery was a major industry in the American South, and Stowe worked with the Underground Railroad to help escaped slaves head north towards freedom. The publication of her book, *Uncle Tom's Cabin*, a scathing anti-slavery novel, fanned the flames that started the Civil War. The book's emotional portrayal of the impact of slavery captured the nation's

attention. A best-seller in its time, Uncle Tom's Cabin sealed Harriet

Beecher Stowe's reputations as one of the

most influential anti-slavery voices in US history.
